District of Innovation Plan

District of Innovation

During the 84th Legislative Session, HB 1842 was passed, allowing Texas public schools to become Districts of Innovation. This designation allows school districts to obtain exemptions from certain provisions of the Texas Education Code. Dublin ISD is exercising this opportunity to gain more local control and flexibility in order to improve educational outcomes for the benefit of the students and community.

Dublin ISD took the first step in exploring this opportunity when the Dublin ISD Board of Trustees approved a resolution initiating the process in March, 2017. The Board then held a public hearing to consider whether the district should develop an innovation plan, at which time the Board decided to move forward in the process appointing a committee to develop an innovation plan. The plan then will be posted online for at least 30 days. Following the 30 days online, the District's Plan of Innovation will go back to the Board for approval.

The term of the Local Innovation Plan will begin at the start of the 2017-2018 school year and end with the 2021-2022 school year, unless terminated or amended earlier by the Board of Trustees in accordance with the law. The committee will revisit the plan annually to ensure that the recommendations are still in line with the needs and wishes of the district.

Areas of Innovation

With regard to each area of innovation, the District declares exemption from the listed statutory provisions, as well as any implementing rules of regulation promulgated pursuant to those statutory provisions by any state agency or entity, including but not limited to the Commissioner of Education, Texas Education Agency, State Board for Educator Certification, and State Board of Education.

1. **School Start Date**

(EB LEGAL)(TEC 25.0811, TEC 25.0812)

Rationale: Relief from this statute could potentially allow the following:

- First semester complete before the Winter Break
- More options for professional development opportunities during the school year.
- Flexibility the first week of school-students would not have a full week.
 - Start date would be no earlier than August 15th.
 - The first week of school would be fewer than 5 instructional days.

2. **State Certification requirements for Teachers and Other Educators**

(DBA LEGAL, DBA LOCAL)(TEC 21.003, TEC 21.053)

Rationale: By exempting the District from this law, the District could allow the following:

- The flexibility to hire teachers to teach hard-to-fill, high demand dual credit, career and technical/STEAM courses.

3. **Instructional Minutes/Length of Instructional Day/ Early Release Days**

(EC LEGAL)(TEC 25.081)

Rationale:

- Exemption from the 420 minute day or the 75,600 minutes per year requirement would allow Dublin ISD the flexibility needed to alter the school day schedule on selected days, whenever it was locally determined as necessary or beneficial to the district and its stakeholders. School districts must seek a waiver of this requirement from TEA in order to provide fewer than the required number of instructional minutes in the case of a natural disaster or calamity. This requirement restricts the District in the development

of the academic calendar, including the scheduling of early release days and staff development days.

- The district seeks relief from this section in order to provide staff development before the start of instruction, as well as additional days throughout the school year. These non-instructional days have been purposefully placed throughout the calendar to allow for teachers to plan instruction based on student instructional data in addition to engaging in relevant, targeted professional development. The district seeks additional flexibility to schedule early release days in the calendar in order to provide for student and district needs.

4. Teacher Employment Contracts

(DC LEGAL)(TEC 21.401)

Rationale: With the implementation of TEC 25.081, which changed the required number of “days of instruction” to “minutes of instruction,” the law did not address contract days for teachers to better align with the “minutes of instruction” requirement.

- DISD would like to have the freedom to consider the reduction in contract days to better align teacher contracts with the number of days students are in attendance.

5. Probationary Contracts

(DCA LEGAL)(TEC 21.102)

Rationale: Current law states that a probationary contract may not exceed one year for a person who has been employed as a teacher in public education for at least five of the eight years preceding employment with the district. This period of time is not sufficient to evaluate the teachers’ effectiveness in the classroom since teacher contract timelines demand that employment decisions must be made prior to the availability of end of year classroom and student data.

- For experienced teachers, counselors, or nurses new to the district that have been employed as a teacher in public education for at least five of the eight previous years, a probationary contract may be issued for up to two years. All other teachers, new to the profession or with less than five years of experience, hired in the district may remain on probationary status for three years, and may be issued a fourth year of probation in accordance with TEC 21.102(c).
